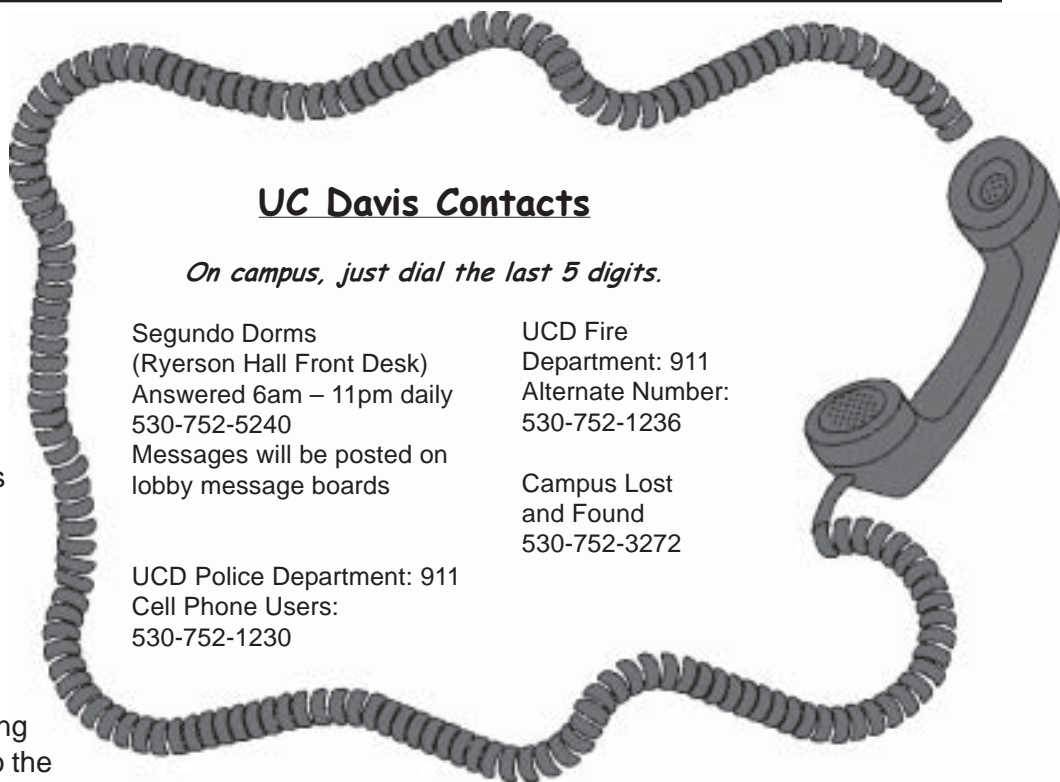
A bookstore, small grocery store and a few additional eating establishments are located in the Memorial Union and will be open during the conference.

Lost Keys

No youth delegates are allowed off-campus. Chaperones needing to leave campus must sign out in the Headquarters. Contact the Conference Director or Deans with questions.

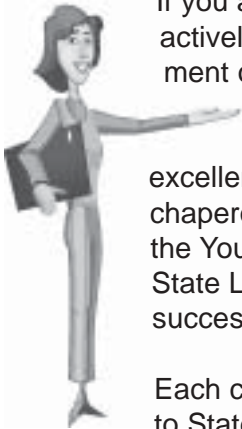
Conference Headquarters

EXPECTATIONS

Chaperon Definitions



If you are willing to commit to actively encouraging the development of the youth during the conference, you are well on your way to being an excellent chaperon. Being a chaperon is a vital part of making the Youth Leadership Summit and State Leadership Conference a success.

Each county sending a delegation to State Leadership Conference should have one male chaperon for every seven male delegates and one female chaperon for every seven female delegates. Some counties may be “sharing” a chaperon with another.

A chaperon’s goal is to supervise and encourage safe and active conference participation of all delegates under his/her care. Chaperone are responsible for the safety and well being of the youth delegates in their care from the time they leave the care of their parent/guardian until they return.

Chaperons need to make themselves available to their delegates. During the conference, a chaperon should know the location of the delegates under their care at all times.

Chaperons are expected to lead by example and attend all sessions and planned activities.

Above all, chaperons need to promote having fun while adhering to the 4-H Code of Conduct, Dress Code and conference rules. A chaperon makes an essential contribution to what each delegate gains from the Youth Leadership Summit and the State Leadership Conference.

Delegate Expectations

The Youth Leadership Summit and the State Leadership Conference Planning Committee want you to have the best possible experience at the conferences, however we understand that much of your experience at the conference depends upon you. Therefore we ask that you carefully read and make every effort to abide by these guidelines while at the conferences:

1. I will behave in a respectable manner and serve as a role model for those around me.
2. I will abide by all the rules for the conferences, including the 4-H Code of Conduct, Dress Code, and Campus Safety Guidelines.

"Continuing the Process of Conversations on Youth Development"

The 2002 Youth Leadership Summit will build on the County, State and National Conversations on Youth Development that took place October 2001 through March 2002. The Summit will allow delegates, both from 4-H and other organizations to delve into the issues in more depth, and through the process, allow counties to focus on one or two particular issues to work on during the year.

The Youth Leadership Summit will bring youth leaders together to develop leadership skills through partnerships and community action. Through participation in

conversation groups, youth will have the chance to discuss topics related to youth and communities.

Prior to registering for the Summit, teams should meet to discuss areas of concern in their county. Delegates should interview 4-Hers along with other community organizations to determine the types of needs in their communities. Delegates will work together to develop a list of issues in youth development that organizations, including 4-H will have to address in the 21st century. Along with this, delegates will spend time creating potential solutions to address the issues identified.

County Delegations to the Youth Leadership Summit will develop an **Action Plan** that outlines what their county needs to do in their local community to address local issues through community action after the conference.

DRESS CODE & CODE OF CONDUCT

Code of Conduct

1. Attend all planned sessions, workshops, and meetings of the event and dress appropriately. Chaperons are responsible for ensuring that members participate in all aspects of the planned program activities.
2. The possession and use of alcoholic beverages and/or drugs, or any controlled substance (other than prescribed medicine) is prohibited. Participants may not smoke in group meetings or in sleeping areas.
3. Setting off fire alarms or tampering with fire extinguishers or other emergency equipment is prohibited.
4. Gambling and betting by youth and adults is prohibited.
5. Obscene and discriminatory language, roughhousing and insubordination will not be tolerated.
6. Youth members and volunteers are expected to demonstrate respect for one another.
7. Display of overly affectionate attention between participants is prohibited.
8. All participants must be in their assigned area at curfew and comply with quiet hours, lights out, and other rules of the event.
9. No member or volunteer may leave the grounds unless permission is secured from the conference director.
10. Only conference delegates may be in dormitory areas. Youth members of the opposite sex are not allowed in the sleeping areas. Lounges may be used for working committees and social activities only.
11. Room service such as phone calls, food, laundry or other will not be permitted.

Dress Code

For All Participants, Including Chaperons

If your clothing cannot be worn at school, it cannot be worn to 4-H events. If you choose to dress inappropriately, you will be asked to change.

All clothing must be neat, clean, and acceptable in repair and appearance and must be worn within the bounds of decency and good taste as appropriate for 4-H events.

Articles of clothing which display profanity, products or slogans, which promote tobacco, alcohol, drugs, sex or are in any other way distracting are prohibited.

Excessively baggy or tight clothing, and clothing which advertises gang symbols or other affiliations is prohibited.

Items of clothing which expose bare midriffs, bare chests, undergarments, or are transparent (see-through) are prohibited. Tank tops are permitted, but spaghetti straps, shirts which expose a bare back, halter tops and tube tops are prohibited.

Shoes must be worn at all appropriate times.

The dress code will be enforced during the dances. However, modestly-cut (prom-type) dresses for women will be allowed.

Swimming:

Men - Swim trunks only (no shorts, cut of pants, Speedos, etc.)

Women - One-piece suits are recommended, however two-piece suits are allowed as long as they are modestly cut. String, thong or crochet suits are prohibited.

Swimsuits may only be worn while in the swimming pool area.

LESSONS FROM GEESE

Lessons From Geese

As each bird flaps its wings, it creates an uplift for the bird following. By flying in a V formation, the whole flock adds 71% greater flying range than if the bird flew alone.

MORAL: People who share a common direction and sense of community can get where they are going quicker and easier because they are travelling on the thrust of one another.



Whenever a goose falls out of formation, it suddenly feels the drag and resistance of trying to fly alone, and quickly gets back into formation to take advantage of the lifting power of the bird immediately in front.

MORAL: If we have as much sense as a goose, we will stay in formation with those who are headed where we want to go (and be willing to accept their help as well as give ours to others).

When the lead goose gets tired, it rotates back into the formation and another goose flies at the point position.

MORAL: It pays to take turns doing the hard tasks, and sharing leadership — people, as geese, are interdependent on one another.

The geese in formation honk from behind to encourage those up front to keep up their speed.

MORAL: We need to make sure that our honking from behind is encouragement, and not something else.

When a goose gets sick or wounded or shot down, two geese drop out of formation and follow it down to help and protect it. They stay with it until it is unable to fly again, or dies. Then they launch out on their own with another formation, or catch up with the flock.

MORAL: If we have as much sense as geese, we too will stand by each other in difficult times, as well as when we are strong.

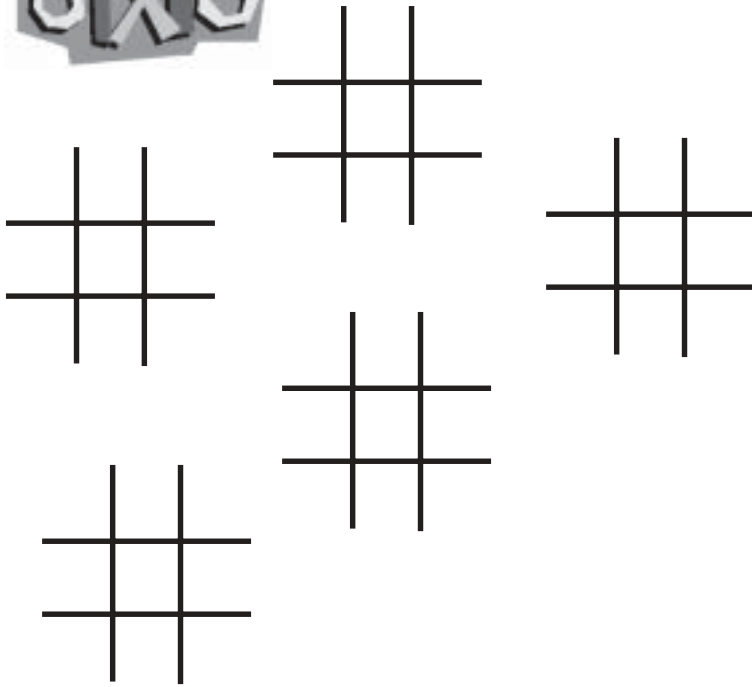
